CALL TO ORDER

Student Trustee H. Jamal called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m.

REVIEW OF AGENDA

ICEBREAKER/TEAM BUILDING ACTIVITY

Student Trustee R. Barnes led the Senators and attendees through a minefield activity at 7:07 p.m.

GUEST SPEAKERS

1. Coordinating Superintendent, Business Services & Treasurer of the Board, Matthew Gerard: *Budget Consultation Follow-Up and Budget Survey Presentation*Coordinating Superintendent, M. Gerard returned to Student Senate to collect feedback from Senators on the budget consultation, announce the budget survey, and answer

questions.Single Stream Recycling question

- From the February Senate meeting
- Problems at schools with students no recycling
- Challenges include contamination and cost from the municipality
- The Mollusk™ idea for underground storage of all recycling
- Graduation rates

- Impact of air conditioning at KCI/WCI on graduation rates
 - Only available in music room and the library at present
 - WCI feasibility study on rebuilding the school or making upgrades to the facilities
 - Budget for this year includes some infrastructure work to upgrade facilities throughout the system
- The Careers course is not very practical on making students aware of jobs and their requirements
- The Civics course should include more practical elements (taxes, voting, how to be an adult)
- Limiting the amount of homework assigned to students or some communication between teachers to ensure that students are not overwhelmed; provide more balance
- More involvement from guidance in helping students apply for college/university, help students realise that they are able to do this; provides support to students during a stressful time
- Starting sooner, not waiting until grade 12 to begin the conversation on their futures, what to do after high school
- Comprehensive involvement of families for ESL students to help them stay engaged
- Extra-curricular component keeps many students at school and is a good support for many; essential
- Softening of the 34 credit policy to make a fifth year more accessible to students;
 spread out their course load and take a co-op programme
- Making courses/classes more accessible (wait lists for courses needed for a university programme; math courses rarely work well online because they need teacher interaction
 - · Some students do not learn well through online courses
- Limiting course conflicts after you have already selected your courses to ensure that students can learn what they're interested in

In-school support for mathematics

- Dedicated math support room at lunch with a math teacher available to answer questions
- Having teaching assistants in the classroom to help provide support during a class
- Desks in small groups to foster collaboration
- Graphing calculators in class sets instead of requiring that each student purchase their own (class sets generally broken or missing)
- Paper textbooks have some benefits (easy to flip from question pages to answer)
- Too great an emphasis on speed (getting through content) over actually learning the material
- Professional development for teachers surrounding how to help struggling students and inspiring students to enjoy learning mathematics
- Are we tracking student achievement in e-learning versus traditional classroom performance (eq. accounting) as a Board?
 - What do we do with this information

Online support for mathematics

- Students do not just want the answers but are looking for something to teach them how to do problems/find answers like Wolfram Alpha (step-by-step solutions, not just final answers)
- Online textbooks may be preferable but math classes typically rarely use any technology
- Encouraging math departments to use Desmos on Chromebooks or mobile devices instead of purchasing graphing calculators
- Touch or stylus enabled devices instead of Chromebooks so students can write answers without being limited to the capabilities of Google Docs for typing formulas or equations
- Increase the availability of online homework help (https://homeworkhelp.ilc.org/) to all grades instead of limiting the service to grades nine and ten only

Student/Staff Well-Being

- Ensuring that each course uses all paper or all electronic; stressful to manage and balance
- Later start times to help student achievement as the academic research indicates that this is more beneficial for students to start later and elementary start earlier; switch elementary and secondary start times
- Teachers should aim to not assign homework, assignments, or projects during the winter break, march break
- Mindfulness minutes at the start of each day to help students prepare and at the end to help students decompress; Plasticity company beginning research at local schools (Vista Hills)
- Being more aware of mental health and having guidance counsellors talk to students about where to find supports
- Include well-being (destress, take time for self) in civics and careers since they are already mandatory
- Students do not know where to go for what problem; where do I go if I'm having a
 panic attack, where do I go if I don't feel safe, etc.?, and making this known to
 parents; clearly communicating *all* available resources to students
- Senior students mentors or buddies to provide some peer tutoring/counselling in cases when it may be necessary
- Accessible teaching materials (videos with subtitles to help those who may be hard of hearing)
- Accessibility of buildings (WCI) and ensuring that students with physical disabilities or injuries can travel the building

POLICIES AND GOVERNANCE

Student Trustee H. Jamal opened the floor to policy and governance information to discuss Student Trustee elections at 8:30 p.m.

- Brief outline of the roles and responsibilities of a Student Trustee
 - Review agenda packages and attend Public and In Camera sessions of the Board and Committee of the Whole, as well as other committee meetings
 - Participate in public discussions of the Board.

- Have his/her vote recorded for the purpose of public record and for accountability to the student body
- Prepare motions or amendments to motions to be submitted by a trustee on their behalf.
- Act with the decorum and expectations of all elected trustees.
- Provide co-chair leadership throughout the year to the Board's Student Senate including calling meetings at least monthly, including the meeting to elect student trustees for the following term of office.
- Application requirements/steps
 - A detailed resume including level of completed education and relevant experiences (2 pages max.)
 - A current transcript of completed courses
 - A record of school attendance for the current year
 - A letter of intent (understanding and objectives in the role)
 - · A letter of recommendation from the student's current principal or a teacher
 - A letter of recommendation from a community member
 - A letter of parental permission for applicants under the age of 18
 - Candidates are to mail all of the above in a single envelope to the Education Centre (51 Ardelt Avenue, Kitchener) or they may deliver them in-person
 - Envelopes must be received no later than April 26 by end-of-day
