There still appears to be some renovations underway on the south side of the building as indicated by the temporary fencing around the portables. It was reported these portables were to be removed now that the renovations are complete.

What is unique or noteworthy about this school?

The original facility is a 1 storey structure of exterior brick construction without a basement.

The Original Building was constructed in 1963.

Addition 1 was added to the northwest of the Original Building in 1966.

Addition 2 was added to the northeast of the Addition 1 and Original building in 1969.

The total floor area of these Original additions is 4, 055 square metres. These are composed of hexagonal shaped classrooms grouped into four pods.

Addition 3 was added in two sections in 2009 at a floor area of 901 square metres. One section containing the new gym was built onto the northeast side of the Original building. The other section, containing classrooms, was built onto Pod #2 on the east side of the original building.

The total floor area of the building is now 4,956 square metres.
