Subject: Reported Student Behaviour Quarterly Data Q4 – 2023-2024

Recommendation:

This report is provided for the Waterloo Region District School Board with information regarding reported incidences of student behaviour for the quarter (**April 16, 2024-June 30, 2024**).

Status:

- The Board continues to experience significant staffing challenges. The Board continues to endeavour to staff schools given high issues of absenteeism within the system and is actively pursuing alternative approaches for emergency staffing. Unforeseen and unplanned disruption continues to impact the delivery of education for students within our system.
- The Board has recently introduced new and innovative staffing initiatives to help support the needs of our highest needs students.
- We continue to be proactive in utilizing our BMS team to support staff and administration in the following ways:
- Responding to student specific referrals addressing supports for safety plans, review of critical incidents, and classroom observations and audits;
- Providing site specific BMS support (i.e., practice a containment, student specific interventions etc.);
- Supporting growing system needs in BMS by continuing to train new trainers;
- Assisting in facilitating the transition of students returning to in-school learning;
- Directly supporting transition planning to ensure staff feel supported and that we are setting both students and staff up for success;
- Proactively identifying schools and students that may require direct support from BMS;
- Analyzing and actively investigating special education paraprofessional resources to better support schools;

Student Behaviour incidents are recorded under four (4) categories in order of severity from least severe to most severe:

Hazard: The worker is reporting a hazard, the worker sustained no injury during the incident, or it was a near miss. The Board and Unions actively encourage employees to report workplace hazards in order to act proactively to prevent more serious incidents.

First aid: Applying minor first aid measures like cleaning minor cuts, scrapes or scratches; applying a band aid, cold compress or ice pack. First Aid is provided at the workplace.

Health care (or medical aid): Worker sustained an injury requiring medical aid from an external health care practitioner (i.e. a doctor, nurse, chiropractor or physiotherapist); services provided at a hospital and/or health facility and/or require prescription drugs. This is required to be reported to the Workers Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB).

Lost Time: The worker sustains injury that requires time away from work after the day of incident and was unable to work. This is required to be reported to the Workers Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB).

Previous Year Quarterly Report Comparison:





We, the Lambton Kent District School Board, are writing to you today regarding an important matter concerning the terminology used in the recently released 2024-25 Core Education Funding Technical Guide for School Boards. We recognize the terminology has been used historically, however the deep dive into the new funding formula triggered members of our community and surfaced these concerns.

As noted in the guide, the terms "Day School" and "Day School Students" are used throughout, particularly in reference to the funding allocations. However, we must recognize that these terms carry significant historical and cultural implications, especially for Indigenous communities across Canada.

Historically, "Day Schools" were institutions that played a role in the assimilation of Indigenous children, aimed at eradicating Indigenous languages and cultures. The use of this term in a contemporary educational funding context could inadvertently perpetuate associations with past injustices and ongoing challenges faced by Indigenous peoples today.

LKDSB is committed to Truth and Reconciliation, and we believe that this commitment necessitates a careful review of terminology that may hold different meanings or implications for Indigenous partners. Therefore, we respectfully request that the Ministry consider revising the term "Day School Renewal" and any related terminology in future publications and educational frameworks.

Furthermore, we encourage the Ministry to acknowledge and recognize that tuition-paying pupils within our school boards should be treated equally as pupils of the board, irrespective of their status or background. This inclusive approach not only aligns with principles of equity and fairness but also demonstrates a sincere commitment to advancing Truth and Reconciliation efforts within our educational system. The current funding formula uses the term "Other Pupils of the Board" for all tuition paying students. Tuition paying students include Indigenous students residing within First Nation communities and international education students. The use of the term "Other Pupils" excludes Indigenous students from feeling part of their school board and their schools and is contrary to the Truth and Reconciliation efforts of school boards.

In conclusion, we urge the Ministry of Education to take proactive steps in addressing these concerns, ensuring that our educational policies and practices are sensitive to the diverse histories and cultural perspectives of all communities we serve.

Thank you for considering our request. We look forward to your response and continued collaboration in fostering an inclusive and respectful educational environment for all.

Les budgets consacrés à l'éducation spécialisée dans de nombreux conseils scolaires de la province sont dépassés année après année, et pourtant, les besoins des élèves ne sont pas toujours pleinement satisfaits.

De nombreux élèves ayant des besoins particuliers ne peuvent pas accéder à un autobus scolaire de la même manière que la plupart des enfants. Depuis quelques années, on remarque une augmentation du nombre de demandes pour du transport spécialisé. Cela pourrait être dû à des problèmes d'autorégulation, à de l'anxiété, à des handicaps physiques, etc. Le transport spécialisé peut être assuré par un autobus adapté, un taxi, une fourgonnette ou avec l'accompagnement d'un moniteur. Cette mesure vise à garantir l'équité. Ces élèves méritent le même accès au transport que les élèves qui peuvent prendre un autobus scolaire régulier.

Pour les conseils scolaires ayant une zone géographique étendue et des composantes rurales, comme le nôtre, ces autobus spécialisés, ces taxis ou ces moniteurs sont indisponibles créant alors, de grands défis pour ces élèves et leurs familles.

Par exemple, si un changement au transport survient au courant de l'année scolaire, il n'y a pas de financement pour l'ajout d'une demande de taxi pour un élève qui a des problèmes aigus de comportement ou de santé mentale. De plus, les moniteurs d'autobus ne sont pas financés spécifiquement; les frais associés à un tel appui sont financés du Fonds pour l'éducation de l'enfance en difficulté et non du transport, réduisant alors le montant pour les programmes et autres services destinés à l'éducation de l'enfance en difficulté.

Le comité consultatif catholique sur l'éducation spécialisée du CSC Nouvelon encourage le ministère de l'Éducation à permettre un financement plus flexible de transport pour prendre en considération les besoins des élèves qui arrivent pendant l'année (ou qui ont de nouveaux besoins). Les fonds pour les priorités locales sont utilisés pleinement à diverses fins et ne peuvent absorber les dépenses supplémentaires requises pour les enfants ayant des besoins particuliers.

Thank you for your email dated June 21, 2024, to the Honourable Todd Smith, Minister of Education. Your email has been forwarded to me and I appreciate the opportunity to respond.

As you are aware, the Ministry of Education (ministry) provided updated guidance regarding ventilation last September. School boards are expected to:

- continue building on established practices to optimize air quality to support healthy and safe learning environments for students and staff; and
- continue plans for and/or make upgrades to improve ventilation infrastructure in schools across the province.

Projects should be prioritized to meet appropriate minimum ventilation guidelines as outlined by the Ontario Building Code and the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE).

The ministry continues to provide approximately \$1.4 billion to school boards each year to renew and improve school facilities, including to support improved ventilation in schools.

The ministry had worked with school boards, the Office of the Chief Medical Officer of Health and the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development to support optimized ventilation and air quality in schools. Thank you for your feedback.

Thank you for your letter to the Honourable Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education, regarding the Ministry of Education's (ministry) timelines on the Capital Priorities Program, the Grants for Student Needs (now called Core Education Funding) and curriculum changes. Your letter has been forwarded to me and I appreciate the opportunity to respond.

With respect to timelines for the Capital Priorities Program, ministry staff are committed to working collaboratively with school boards to provide guidance and respond to questions as boards consider the development of future capital plans throughout the year. The ministry encourages school boards to continue to develop its top priority projects to improve their build readiness for future rounds of Capital Priorities.

As you may be aware, the ministry recently launched the 2024-25 Capital Priorities Program. Waterloo Region District School Board is now able to submit their priority projects for ministry funding consideration until September 16, 2024. The ministry looks forward to reviewing submissions received by the board.

Regarding timelines on Core Education Funding, since receiving your letter, the ministry released the Core Education Funding or "Core Ed" for the 2024-25 school year. As you are likely aware, Core Ed is increasing to more than \$28.6 billion for the upcoming school year.

The average Core Education funding per student is also projected to increase to \$13,852. Together with funding in Responsive Education Programs, funding is projected to total \$29 billion. The Ministry appreciates your feedback on Core Education Funding timing and will take that into consideration for future releases.

With respect to curriculum timelines, the ministry aims to issue curriculum as early as possible in advance of the implementation date to ensure teachers can be made aware of updates and prepare accordingly. The ministry will also provide resources and training opportunities for educators to support the implementation of all curriculum, including key changes documents, implementation webinars, and parent guides. Further supports may be determined over the course of the curriculum revision process. The updated curriculum will be added to the <u>Curriculum and Resources website</u> as it becomes available.

As we begin the 2024-25 school year, we are writing on behalf of the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) to request an urgent review and update of the Ontario College of Teachers' Professional Advisories pertaining to Mental Health, Bullying, and the Use of Electronic and Social Media. The TDSB is similar to many other school boards across Ontario in the diversity of students, communities and stakeholders it serves. We proudly welcome over 236, 000 students and over 231, 000 members of the Ontario College of Teachers. This diversity underscores the need for additional resources to create learning and working environments that respect their identities and contribute to their sense of belonging and safety. Recent developments have highlighted the pressing need for these updates:

• **Support for Anti-Hate Strategies:** On <u>November 30, 2023</u>, Chair Chernos Lin wrote to the Ministry of Education expressing the Toronto District School Board's full support for the Ontario Human Rights Commission's call for a comprehensive, well-resourced province-wide anti-hate strategy. This initiative is essential to counteract the alarming rise in hate incidents impacting schools and communities across Toronto and Ontario.

• **Provincial Reporting Standards:** On <u>April 5, 2024</u>, Chair Chernos Lin addressed a letter to the Minister of Education highlighting a Board motion advocating for provincial reporting standards or guidance and the development of a tool for collecting data on incidents of hate and racism. This data is crucial for our ability to respond effectively to these incidents.

• **Geopolitical Tensions**: Our schools have been increasingly affected by geopolitical issues, which impact both students and staff. In this context, Trustees have requested that the Ministry develop a working definition of hate activity, engage various stakeholders in developing a comprehensive Policy/Program Memorandum (PPM), and initiate training and resources to help navigate these tensions.

Given the seriousness of these issues and the need for a sound approach to managing them, it is vital that the Professional Advisories of the Ontario College of Teachers be reviewed and updated to reflect these contemporary challenges. Specifically, we seek enhancements in the following areas:

- **Mental Health:** Guidance should address the intersection of mental health and the current socio-political climate, providing educators with tools to support students grappling with stress and anxiety related to geopolitical conflicts.
- **Bullying:** Advisories should be updated to address emerging forms of bullying, including those amplified by digital platforms, ensuring that schools have clear strategies to prevent and respond to bullying in all its forms. The College should also consider providing guidance on preventing and responding to hate to its members.
- **Use of Electronic and Social Media:** The rapid evolution of social media requires updated advisories that guide educators on managing online interactions and addressing the spread of misinformation or harmful content.

These updates are critical to ensure that educators are equipped with the knowledge and resources necessary to create safe, supportive, and inclusive learning environments for all students. The role of the Ontario College of Teachers in maintaining these standards is crucial to our collective efforts to uphold the values of democracy, human rights, and respect for diversity in education.

We appreciate your attention to this urgent matter and look forward to your response.
