Dear Minister Dunlop,

I am writing on behalf of the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) to urge a review and amendment of the current legislation and regulations pertaining to Education Development Charges (EDCs). Our Board is committed to supporting housing and homelessness solutions within our community, but we face significant challenges under the existing legislative framework.

We respectfully request the following actions:

**Review and Amend EDC Legislation:** We urge the Ministry to consider amending the existing legislative scheme to allow school boards to apply a different rate or scheme for not-for-profit or supportive housing projects. This flexibility is crucial to ensure that school boards can support these vital community projects without facing penalties or losing essential core educational funding.

**Support for Housing and Homelessness Solutions:** Any amendments made to the EDC framework should enable school boards to support housing and homelessness solutions within their communities, while maintaining the necessary financial resources to address core educational needs. This balance is essential to ensure that our educational institutions can continue to provide high-quality education while also contributing to broader community well-being.

Additionally, we emphasize the need for a statutory exemption for affordable housing. The current legislated \$300 cap makes it difficult for boards to recalculate costs related to housing categories for differentiated rates. Given that EDCs are imposed at a provincial level, any changes to the legislation would support affordable housing across the province, not just in Hamilton. This province-wide approach would ensure that all communities benefit from more flexible and supportive EDC regulations.

We believe that these changes are necessary to create a more equitable and supportive environment for both education and housing. Thank you for considering our request and for your continued dedication to improving our province.

Dear Joanne Weston,

Thank you for your letter; I really appreciated your kind words of congratulations. It is an incredible honour to become Ontario's Education Minister and I do not take this responsibility lightly. As a mom to three incredible daughters, I am intimately familiar with the way our province's public education system improves and transforms lives.

In the six years since our government was first elected, Ontario's schools have faced incredible and unprecedented disruptions to student learning. I'm proud to say our education system met those challenges with courage and compassion. Students, teachers, parents, support staff, and everyone

Over the past year, we successfully reached agreements with all the province's teachers' unions and in doing so, prevented the possibility of any teacher strikes. Keeping kids in class was critically important in allowing us to deliver our back-to-basics plan.

Thanks to the actions we have taken, Ontario families are seeing many key changes in their local schools including a classroom cell phone ban, restrictions on social media and stricter enforcement on vaping. There will also be a renewed focus on fundamental subjects, such as reading, writing and math, and updates to our curriculum that will teach students financial literacy and other practical life skills they will need after graduation.

As Education Minister, I will always put students and families first. While I am proud of our government's successes so far, I am excited to continue to drive transformational change in the education system with the support of teachers, principals, parents and other key partners.

#### RE: Two-Year Update Right to Read Report

On behalf of the Rainy River District School Board, I am writing to inquire about the next steps to respond to *The Right to Read Report* recommendations. The Ontario Human Rights Commission (OHRC) released *The Right to Read Inquiry Report* in February 2022. The *Report* outlines critical changes to teaching early reading, with 157 interconnected recommendations for school boards, faculties of education, and the Ministry of Education.

This fall, the OHRC released a status update on the progress toward meeting the recommendations. While considerable progress has been made across the province with the updated Gr. 1-8 Language Arts curriculum, the Policy Program Memorandum 168, and the release of *Effective Early Reading Instruction – A teacher's guide*, it was noted that Benchmarks 4 and 5 – the benchmarks related to accommodations and professional assessments - showed little to no progress.

These benchmarks include the following next steps:

- standardization around learning disabilities, specifically when professional assessments occur and how assessments should be used
- updated Individual Education Plan guidelines, to reflect the implementation of literacy assessments and interventions
- greater guidance on the appropriate use of accommodations and modifications

As noted in the *Two-Year Update Right to Read Report*, "When it comes to meeting students' right to read, Ontario needs consistency and stability. This means clear, mandatory standards related to curriculum and instruction, early screening, reading interventions, accommodations, and professional assessments." As a school board invested in the work to enhance our literacy practices and our students' educational outcomes, we look to the Ministry of Education for information on the next steps and timelines to respond to these benchmarks.

We thank you in advance for your consideration of this request and look forward to your response.

#### **Urgent Need for Student Nutrition Programs in our Schools**

I am writing to you on behalf of the Simcoe County District School Board (SCDSB) to express our strong support for the establishment of student nutrition programs in all Ontario schools. As advocates for student well-being, we believe that access to nutritious food is essential for academic success and overall health.

#### The challenge:

Across Canada, many students face food insecurity, which directly impacts their ability to learn and thrive. Hunger and malnutrition hinder concentration, cognitive development, and overall educational outcomes. A 2022 Statistics Canada report shows that 6.9 million people in 10 provinces, including almost 1.8 million children, lived in households struggling to afford the food they need. As a school board, we witness first-hand the effects of food insecurity on our students, and we are committed to addressing this critical issue.

The SCDSB has 88 elementary schools, 16 secondary schools and seven learning centres serving approximately 57,000 students with close to 7,000 staff. According to the Ontario Ministry of Education up to 35 per cent of students in some SCDSB schools are living in poverty. The County of Simcoe's 2021 Census publicized that an average of 9.1 per cent of children under 17 are living as low-income status, and within some regions that number climbs to 32 per cent.

In Ontario 30.7 per cent of students under 18 are living in Food-insecure Households (Canadian Income Survey 2022). In Simcoe Muskoka 18 per cent of households are food insecure. Students in Grade 7 to 12 report that less than half eat breakfast before school and more than 2,200 (5 per cent) students go to bed or school hungry daily (Ontario Student Health and Drug Use Survey).

#### The solution:

A provincial student nutrition program would provide consistent and equitable access to healthy food for all students, regardless of their socio-economic background. By implementing such a program, we can:

1. **Enhance learning:** Proper nutrition positively influences cognitive function, memory retention, and concentration. When students have access to nutritious food, they are better equipped to engage in learning.



- 2. **Promote health and well-being:** A well-balanced diet contributes to physical health, mental well-being, and overall resilience. By nourishing our students, we invest in their long-term health outcomes.
- 3. **Reduce stigma:** A universal program eliminates the stigma associated with receiving subsidized food. All students benefit equally, fostering a sense of inclusivity and community.
- 4. **Support families:** A provincial student nutrition program would alleviate financial strain on families, ensuring children receive nourishing food during the school day.

#### Our request:

We are asking that the provincial government match the federal governments commitment to a national food program to support the provision of food in our Ontario schools. We urge the provincial government to collaborate with the federal government and community organizations to develop and fund school nutrition programs in our schools. This program should prioritize fresh, locally sourced ingredients, cultural diversity, and sustainability.

#### Conclusion:

We believe that investing in our students' nutrition is an investment in Ontario's future. By working together, we can create a program that ensures no child goes hungry while pursuing their education.

We kindly request your support and advocacy for the swift implementation of student nutrition programs in all of our Ontario schools. A similar joint letter of request has been sent to the Committee of the Whole, County of Simcoe, from the SCDSB and Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board. Let us join forces to nourish our students and empower them to reach their full potential.

Thank you for your attention to this critical matter. We look forward to positive action that will benefit generations of Ontario students.
