Business Arising from the Minutes

 Jenn Checkley, Easter Seals, Wondered about the slide show from the Anti-Ableism Symposium presentation and if members were able to share it with people outside our group. She would like to share with the Easter Seals rep for Ontario. Jodi Albrecht, WRDSB Superintendent, shared that she can share the presentation.

WRDSB Special Education & Student Well-Being Report - Jodi Albrecht

- System Updates
 - Last month at the October meeting, Teresa Dunat, Special Education Consultant, came and shared information about the Anti-Ableism Symposium held in May and what we learned from the event. From the last meeting we gathered information from this group and are working on a plan for next steps to facilitate another event. We continue our focus on students and are committed to ensuring we have participants from both mainstream and ACE settings.
 - SEAC asked to add students from grades 7 & 8. We are looking for a venue to accommodate the size of the group, it may need to have parallel days to include everyone.

- Currently looking at students in grades 9-12, from ACE and mainstream settings to be included. Then another day for grade 7 & 8 students.
- Students that were involved last year will be part of the planning. We are inviting their voices to plan the next symposium.
- The staff that will be attending will be learning through another facilitator. We would like the collective student voice to influence what the staff are learning.

Information on Transitions

- Funds are available through the Ministry to support improving educational outcomes for our students. Transitions can be a barrier into school, between schools, leaving secondary school, attending post secondary education, within the community, and in joining the workforce.
 - Staff will work collaboratively with the Board and with agencies to develop a plan of action.
 - Focus on developing resources and tools to have successful transitions for all students.
 - Working on maintaining consistency as a long term goal.
 - Will come back to SEAC a few times throughout the year to get feedback on the work.
 - Want to raise awareness to all staff, students, families, teachers in the classroom, and community members.
- Regional Assessment Resource Centre (RARC).
 - Supports students with disabilities across the province that are transitioning to post secondary.
 - They are holding a <u>Transition Information Night</u> on Nov 26, 2024 from 6-7pm.

- The WRDSB is currently working on the 3 year Mental Health and Addiction Plan for the 2025-26 to 2028-29 school years. The group will come and talk to SEAC in the future and get feedback.

Discussion/Feedback

- Math Achievement Action Plan Presented by Siobhan Watters
 (System Administrator, Learning Support Services), Rhonda Hewer &

 - Math Achievement Action Plan Presentation

Feedback:

- Questioned if ACE teachers were included in decision making. Siobhan Watters responded yes, and they are now at a school level assessing what materials in the plans are going to be used in congregated settings and are also exploring through discussions with other school boards. They are finalizing concepts at this time.
- For a student with disabilities solely relying on tech is very challenging; need to make sure that things are balanced with other teaching strategies.
- Math has a lot of words and students with accommodations are trying to figure out how to navigate reading and comprehension on top of learning math.
- Students who have mobility issues, trouble with coordination, or limited dexterity, may lack the strength or power to apply pressure to utilize tech being provided. Looking for solutions/modifications to make things equitable and inclusive to all students.
- Tools like Google read and write need to be added to
 EQAO to support our students. Brought in the SEA team
 to help them know how to use technology to teach math.

 Asking for future work with the Fast Forward program to help share resources for the grade 9 de-streamed curriculum.

Chair Report for discussion/feedback - Shannon Taylor

SEAC website

- The website has been updated with a more supportive lens making it more inviting and easier to understand for those trying to access SEAC.
- Would like to get a sense of how many people are engaging with
 SEAC through the website from families and the community.
- Contemplating adding a drop down on the website to capture how people connect and reach out to SEAC.
- Informed the website has a translation option on the upper right side.
 This can translate the text to other languages and is helpful for MLL learners and families.

Topics of learning for the year

- Facility dogs or Service dogs would be a topic to discuss and learn about, to support families, and schools.
- Adding reports by the different SEAC associations. Learning about their associations and challenges they are experiencing in school.
 Possibly involving students to share success stories. Really interested in hearing from our students and how they are experiencing learning within the WRDSB.
- Health class information, including sexual health within the special education system. Specifically looking at congregated classes and ACE classes.
- Understanding how special education is set up in the WRDSB. What
 is available in the elementary and secondary panels, and where are

the specialized programs located. Finding out how many kids are identified with a learning disability for exceptionality.

- A Special Budget meeting took place at the same time as SEAC and therefore no Trustees were able to attend but they provided the <u>Trustees</u> Report.
- Joe Meissner and Samantha Estoesta will be continuing to support SEAC as it is a 4 year term.
